As a sequel to that the present work Bhagat Singh's 'Jail Note Book', Its Context and Relevance by Harish Jain represents an exceptionally tenacious and laborious search and research into the specific and authentic sources of the particular notes and quotes entered in the Jail Notebook. The story of the author's exploration for over a decade, searching and identifying books by following astute guesses and hunches, and rummaging through many likely or probable books accessible at that time, many of which were not easily available now, makes a fascinating reading. Contextualising the importance and reach of the ideas of the various authors in those times helps one to understand why they might have appeared significant to Bhagat Singh. Besides discussing the ideas central to the books he read attempt has been made here to explain the import of the quotes he chose to copy. A unique work of its kind, this study is

both enriching and a pleasure to read.

The term 'revolutionary' is used liberally in histories of Indian anticolonialism, but scarcely defined. Sukhdev Thapar was a member of the Hindustan Socialist Republican Association (HSRA); and organised revolutionary cells in Punjab and other areas of North India. He also taught at the National College in Lahore; where he and other revolutionaries also established the Naujawan Bharat Sabha; an organisation involved in various activities intended mainly to prepare youths for the struggle for independence and putting an end to communalism. Sukhdev is best remembered for his involvement in the Lahore Conspiracy Case of 18 December 1928 and its aftermath. He was an accomplice of Bhagat Singh; and Shivaram Rajguru; whose conspiracy led to the assassination of Deputy Superintendent of Police; J. P. Saunders

in 1928 in response to the violent death of a veteran leader; Lala Lajpat Rai. After the Central Assembly Hall bombings in New Delhi on 8 April 1929; the conspirators were arrested and convicted of their crime. On 23 March 1931; the three men were hanged. Their bodies were secretly cremated on the banks of the Satluj river.

Bhagat Singh WHY I AM AN ATHEIST? (Other Letter) - Bhagat Singh 2021-01-01

Bhagat Singh (1907 – 23 March 1931) was an Indian socialist revolutionary whose two acts of dramatic violence against the British in India and execution at age 23 made him a folk hero of the Indian independence movement. Bhagat Singh was an outstanding revolutionary and martyr of the Indian anti-colonial movement. He represented the youth who were dissatisfied with Gandhian politics and groped for revolutionary alternatives. Bhagat Singh studied the European revolutionary movement and was attracted to anarchism and communism. He became a confirmed atheist, socialist and communist. He realised that the overthrow of British rule should be accompanied by the socialist reconstruction of Indian society and for this political power must be seized by the workers. Bhagat Singh and B.K. Dutt enunciated their understanding of revolution in a statement made in connection with the Assembly Bomb case on 6th June, 1929: 'By Revolution we mean that the present order of things, which is based on manifest injustice must change. Producers or labourers, in spite of being the most necessary element of society, are robbed by their exploiters of their labour and deprived of their

elementary rights. The peasant who grows corn for all, starves with his family; the weaver who supplies the world market with textile fabrics, has not enough to cover his own and his children's bodies; masons, smiths and carpenters who raise magnificent palaces, live like pariahs in the slums. The capitalists and exploiters, the parasites of society, squander millions on their whims.'
